Conflicts	What conflicts do the characters face? Briefly describe problems characters encounter.

Points of View	What point of view does the author use? Who tells the story?
Important Events – Past	Explain the important events that are mentioned or that occur prior to the start of the novel in these chapters. I $\frac{1}{2}$
Important Events – Present	Explain the important events that are mentioned or that occur in these chapters. (1+2)

· An inference is a <u>CONCLUGION</u> based on <u>textual</u> evidence and <u>reasoning</u>.

· Textual evidence + Reasoning = Conclusion *Textual evidence = quotes directly from the book.
